

Manx "Sea Invocation" used in York propitiation

Earlier this month, Thomas Green and his friends and family in York carried out a propitiation ceremony for 'Fossarina' the spirit of their local river Foss, to give thanks for not flooding during the various recent storms and to propitiate her for the future.

The group of singers and instrumentalists used the Manx Gaelic song, "Sea Invocation"; first sung over a drone, then into an arrangement for two flutes, and finally

sung by everyone.

Thomas' grand-daughter then read an ode that she'd written, and then they all played a tune called Peaceful River. Finally Thomas made her a small libation. "I hope Fossarina was pleased."




NB. Thomas told us about his visit to the Isle of Man with dance group, Rinkaghyn, in the March KMJ.



"A REMARKABLE RENAISSANCE"

Dr Fenella Bazin gave a fascinating talk to Michael Heritage Trust recently and it was filmed by Culture Vannin.


"THE ERECTION OF A NEW SINGERS' GALLERY" (1851)

On Sunday last, two sermons were preached in the Primitive Methodist Chapel, Peel, by the Rev. G. Dawson, when collections were made towards defraying the expenses incurred by the erection of a new singers' gallery, and other improvements. The congregations were good, and the contributions liberal.

As can be seen, change was afoot in the Primitive Methodist Chapel in Peel, where "a new singers' gallery" had recently been erected. The musical life of the Island in the nineteenth century was not a static one, and it was not just musical taste and fashion that changed, but also the organisation of musical life and practice in places of worship such as here in the Methodist chapel.

POVERTY, PASSION AND POETRY

The Life of Eliza Craven Green
Seamstress, Actor and Poet
by Spencer Needs

This biography brings to light the life of Eliza Craven Green (1803 – 1866), an early Victorian poet who attained literary acclaim despite her humble origins.

Eliza was born in Leeds in 1803 to parents who had fallen on hard times. By her early twenties she and her younger sister had become actors. They were recruited to act in the Isle of Man and during their stay there Eliza had poetry published in the island's newspapers.

Returning to England she lived in Manchester and met her future husband through the theatre. She also became very involved in the vibrant Manchester literary scene.

After she married, she and her husband lived in Leeds at addresses in courts and yards - indicating an existence that was close to poverty level. As a wife and mother her acting diminished but she maintained her poetic output. The main themes of children, nature and topical issues, and her love for the Isle of Man, were often written with great passion.

She began to write short stories for monthly magazines. After her husband deserted her, the money she earned from these short stories became a lifeline for the family as her occupation as a seamstress, a sweated trade, paid below-subsistence wages.

Her major work *Sea Weeds and Heath Flowers* or *Memories of Mona* was published in 1858 and contains 138 poems. It went to a second edition and a paperback version was also printed.

Eliza is best remembered today for her 1854 poem "Ellan Vannin', which was set to music by J. Townsend and is still much loved in the Isle of Man.

The Manx National Concert of 1934

by Maurice Powell

The January issue of KMJ contained an extract from the *Radio Times* showing details of a 'Programme of Manx National Music' presented by the London Manx Society and broadcast on 18th May 1927. Seven years later, in July 1934, another concert featuring Manx traditional music, albeit on an altogether larger scale, was broadcast from the Palace Coliseum in Douglas. Here is a brief account of what was hailed in the local newspapers as 'a full-blooded Manx National Concert . . . and a great event'.

The concert, one of five events broadcast from different venues at that time, was organised by Charles Fox* at the invitation of the BBC and was broadcast on Sunday 1st July from 'a crowded Palace Coliseum'.** The *Isle of Man Examiner* predicted that '. . . this concert will undoubtedly be the greatest Manx National Concert we have ever heard . . . a treat in store for those who tune in on the North Regional wave . . .'

Harry Wood, the Musical Director of the Palace & Derby Company, was in overall charge of the concert and contributed enormously to its success as he had in January 1897* for the first Grand Concert of Manx National Music following the publication of *Manx National Songs*. Thirty-seven years later he was responsible for orchestrating many of the vocal items, engaging the soloists and the orchestra, and conducting part of the concert.

The concert commenced at 8.30 pm with the hymn *Onward Christian Soldiers*, followed by the overture to Rossini's *William Tell*, the aria *O Don Fatale* from Verdi's *Don Carlo* sung by Ada Mylchreest, and *When Childer Plays* performed by the Ramsey Ladies Cushag Choir under their conductor Mary Purcell Black.*

The Manx, broadcast, part of the evening commenced at 9.05 pm with Haydn Wood's *A Manx Rhapsody* conducted by the composer, the principal guest conductor. J. E. Quayle, 'one of noted Manx musicians',* conducted his arrangement for orchestra of *Oh, what if the fowler my blackbird has taken,* and Haydn Wood, 'who has done a lot of good for us in introducing many of our old tunes', returned to direct a performance of his *Mannin Veen*.

Ada Mylchreest (contralto) sang Mylecharane and Graih my Chree (Love of My Heart) and The Battle of Santwat; John Christian (tenor) sang Mannin veg villish veen, Sooree (A song on Farmer's Daughters (version no. 1) and Ny Kirree fo Niaghtey (The Sheep under the Snow); Margaret Minay (mezzo-soprano) sang A Song on Farmer's Daughter (version no. 2, Kiark Catriney maroo), Home (Moghrey laa Boaldyn) and Robin and Betsy; J. W. Kelly, of Peel, sang

The Manx Wedding (Car y Phoosee) and Ramsey Town. Some songs were sung in Manx and others in English, and all were 'greatly enjoyed'.

The Cushag Choir featured prominently in the broadcast part of the concert and contributed *The Fair Maids of Man, She Sang to her Spinet, The Harvest of the Sea, Hush, Little Darling* and *Ellan Vannin.* Mrs Ethel Barrow, piano, played Harry Wood's Manx Fairy Tale: *The L'il Fella* accompanied by the orchestra - 'a delightful item' - and the evening concluded at 10.25 pm with Harry Wood's new military march, *March of the Manx Legionnaires*, which included four Manx tunes, the *Manx National Anthem* and *God Save the King*.

Although the Coliseum was crowded, many people stayed at home to 'hear how the concert came through' over the radio. The *Ramsey Courier* of Friday 6th July summed up succinctly: 'The concert was a wonderful success in every way and should do much to advertise the Island'.

THE DANCES - Excerpt from ... while the others did some capers': the Manx Traditional Dance revival 1929 to 1960 by Cinzia Curtis:

1. Rinkaghyn Vannin ~ 1.17 Ben Rein y Voaldyn

There are no references to this dance other than its publication in 1983 in Rinkaghyn Vannin, in which it states that it was collected by Douglas. The tune 'Moghrey Laa Boaldyn' is included in Gilchrist's exposition of Clague's collection (JFSS, no 64, 1924) as a dance tune, but this is the only, very tenuous, reference to any historical source for the dance.

Ensemble Émigré presents: Summer of an Internee Norbert Meyn – singer and narrator Christopher Gould - piano

In a private concert in the Empress Hotel (28 March) created for the Jewish Renaissance/Insiders-Outsiders/ AJR tour to the Isle of Man, Ensemble Émigré presented works by musicians who found refuge in Britain from Nazi persecution in the 1930s. The composers Ferdinand Rauter, Peter Gellhorn, Karl Rankl, Erwin Weiss and Hans Gál were all interned on the Isle of Man in 1940/41. The programme included compositions that were written on the Island: 'Sommer des Gefangenen' (Summer of an Internee) by Erwin Weiss, performed here for the first time since 1940, as well as six songs from the bilingual comic revue 'What a Life!' by Hans Gál. The musical works were introduced with short readings from diaries and letters and the concert was based on Norbert Meyn's research at the Royal College of Music about the legacy of migrant musicians from Nazi Europe in Britain.
