Yn Chruinnaght Celtic Gathering has been celebrating Manx, Irish, Cornish, Welsh, Scottish and Breton culture for nearly 45 years. Now based in Peel, a fishing town on the beautiful west coast of the Isle of Man, the festival presents six days of music and dance concerts, family friendly ceilis, talks & workshops, Celtic language & literature, delicious food 'n' folk sessions, an artisan craft fair and lots of free community events. The 2022 line-up includes an exclusive reunion gig with Scottish band Deaf Shepherd, Irish fiddle maestro Frankie Gavin accompanied by Catherine McHugh, and one of the hottest bands on the Celtic scene today, Mec Lir. There'll be Manx music and dance galore, with the Mega Manx Ceili and the premiere of a new musical work by young Manx fiddle player Isla Callister. Festival-goers will also enjoy sea shanties from Bryher's Boys from Cornwall, and colourful dance displays from Welsh team Dawnswyr Gwerin Pen-y-Fai.

The entertainment on Tynwald Day before and after the Ceremony is always a focal point for friends and family. The entertainment starts at 9am with all day activities including happening in Bunscoill Ghaelgagh, the Arboretum, Cooil y Ree as well as the stallholders on the back Fairfield.


Lots of locations around the main fairfield offer activities for everyone to join in for free. Outdoors on the Tynwald Green and the Royal Chapel there will be traditional Manx dancing, including the Grand Manx Dance, and live music from local silver bands, orchestra and choirs scheduled throughout the day.

The fairfield will also host music and dancing from local groups and don't forget the stage down in the Global Village in the Arboretum. Hosted by the One World Centre from 10am the Global Village offers food and entertainment from around the world.

Tywnald's roots lie in the Viking customs of those who settled in the Island in the tenth century and the Viking Village in Cooil y Ree offers a glimpse into what life was like a thousand years ago.

The TynwaldFest tent will be the focus for children's entertainment with a family craft workshop running from 10am with theatre and dance performances in the afternoon. The deckchairs will be out and we welcome everyone to stay for the dancing part of the evening. From 5pm there will be local food and drink available and the live music starts - perfect for all the family. The activities on Tynwald Day are brought to a close at 10pm by the magnificent Ellan Vannin Pipes and Drums performing the Manx Anthem on Tynwald Hill.

MAKE MUSIC DAY 2022

The Isle of Man joined the rest of the world in celebrating the 40th anniversary celebration of 'Make Music Day' or 'Laa Jannoo Kiaull' on June 21st. Launched in 1982 in France as Fête de la Musique, Make Music Day is held in more than 120 countries.

As part of the international "The Global Folk Challenge", Manx youth group Bree met in the Henry Bloom Noble Library in Douglas to film a German song called "Nun will der Lenz uns grüßen":

Also on the day itself, Dr Chloe Woolley from Culture Vannin took visiting Breton accordion Thomas Moisson and Manx musician David Kilgallon to perform for several schools, before playing live on Manx Radio and then outside the Breizh Vannin Creperie in Douglas.

Some Manx musicians decided to try Make Music Day's 'On Location' theme, where they were tasked with performing a song or tune at an iconic or interesting location. Mine's a Shanty chose to perform "Roll Down" and "Chicken on a Raft" next to the pirate-themed dolphin sculpture at Douglas Head, and Tiffany Kerruish & Peddyr Cubberley performed a couple of original tunes by Peddyr; "The Buzy Dizzy / Tiffy Troailtagh" in the iconic Barrel Room of the Fynoderee Distillery in Ramsey. Sravanti Mazumdar released her version of 'Ellan Vannin' to celebrate the day too: https://youtu.be/R9Q20TdPsV0 Un Choraa Manx Gaelic choir, which consists of children and parents from the Bunscoill Ghaelgagh chose to stage a flash-mob performance at the start of school day, Ruby Biskee Taylor sang in Strand Street and The Mannic Ukes joined the Jukulelians at Jurby Community Centre to all perform together!

It's been a busy time in the island's primary schools as many have explored and celebrated the Isle of Man's UNESCO Biosphere status with a special week of activities.

Pupils from Sulby and St Mary's primary schools took part in workshops, delivered by Dr Chloe Woolley of Culture Vannin and Jo Callister of Department of Education, Sport and Culture, undertaking selected activities from Culture Vannin's #40manxthings challenge. Dr Chloe Woolley, Manx Music development officer said, "Our intangible cultural heritage is an important part of why we were chosen to be a Biosphere reserve. The workshops were a fun way for the children to prepare for Tynwald Day by learning some Manx phrases and a folk dance; listening to some Manx music and an old fairy tale, and having a go at singing in Manx. The children completed nine of the #40manxthings challenges in just one workshop. We hope that they now have the tools and the confidence to complete some more of the challenges within their school or at home."

Launched earlier this year as part of Culture Vannin's 40th anniversary celebrations, #40manxthings presents an opportunity to get involved, try something new, and have some fun with Manx culture.

With 40 activities to pick from, featuring everything from spotting Manx place names through to visiting a glen you've never been to before, you can choose if you just try one or two, or get stuck into completing the whole set. Whatever you do, you're sure to have a great time! You can let Culture Vannin and the wider Manx community know how you get on by sharing a photo or story using the hashtag #40manxthings

Jo Callister, Advisory Teacher for the Manx Curriculum & Climate Change said, "The week was chosen as it falls before the Isle of Man's national week and as such schools have not only be learning about sustainability and environmental issues, they were also focusing on our local traditions and Manx language and culture through a host of special lessons, speakers, trips out, crafts and creativity."



CREEAGHT - NEW MUSIC BY ISLA CALLISTER

Culture Vannin has commissioned Manx musician and Gaelic speaker Isla to compose a very special suite of music which explores the lives, experiences and legacies of courageous women who have shaped the history of the Isle of Man, and it will be premiered at Yn Chruinnaght Celtic Gathering. The suite, named 'Creeaght', meaning courage in Manx Gaelic, focusses on Sophia Morrison, Angèle Kneale and the women behind the Campaign for Abortion Law Modernisation and 'Handmaid's IOM.'

The stories of these amazing women - spanning 160 years - will be shared, celebrated and bound together in a musical performance by an all woman-identifying ensemble, featuring artwork by award winning Manx illustrator Jo Davies.

Isla will be joined by Anna Garvin, a BBC Young Traditional Musician semi-finalist and accomplished piano player from the West Coast of Scotland, along with talented Manx musicians Katie Lawrence, Mera Royle, Kirsty Lawrence and Ruth Keggin, with spoken word from Annie Kissack.

Jo Davies art work will be exhibited throughout Yn Chruinnaght in the Peel Centenary Centre Atholl Room.

Raised on the rich culture and music from the island, Isla's music reflects a strong connection to her native language, music and home whilst drawing on influences from the prominent Irish session scene on the island, and her mother's homeland of Scotland.

Isla grew up performing at Inter-Celtic festivals on the Isle of Man and further afield, where her passion for performing, collaborating and bringing Manx music and language to a wider audience began to flourish. In 2016, she moved to Scotland to study Traditional Music at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland in Glasgow, where she is now based and working with bands TRIP, HEISK and other projects. Having performed all over the UK and further afield, including internationally acclaimed



festivals such as Celtic Connections, Orkney Folk Festival, HebCelt, Festival Interceltique de Lorient and Celtic Colours, Isla is looking forward to returning home to premiere her new musical work 'Creeaght' at Yn Chruinnaght festival.

Orchestra premieres work by renowned composer for anniversary

The Isle of Man Wind Orchestra is to premiere a work by a world famous composer to mark its 25th anniversary.

Manx Dances by Martin Ellerby will be performed for the first time at St Ninian's Church, Douglas, on Friday 1st July, 7.30pm, with the composer present in the audience.

Martin Ellerby [pictured on left with Paul Dunderdale] is one of the world's best known composers of music for brass bands and wind and concert orchestras.

In composing the music, Martin Ellerby has renewed a friendship with the orchestra that began when he composed *Five Manx Romances* for its 20th

anniversary and visited the Island to research the pieces.

'That work concerned itself with historic locations and events on the Island which resonated with me and all of which I had visited,' he said.

'I was delighted to be asked to write for the orchestra again, this time for its 25th anniversary.

'Manx Dances features four movements: Castletown, Ramsey, Point of Ayre and Peel.The new work celebrates diverse coastal places so as to include the whole Island – the art of diplomacy.

'The four movements are Castletown, a bright and lively opening with unexpected turns here and there; Ramsey, a gently lilting, yet passionate, movement that comes into focus only to


slip away again; Point of Ayre, a contrasting, concise, miniature featuring a solo oboe to concentrate the music on a single voice, backed by a transparent orchestration, played reflectively; and Peel, played vivace (very lively) and featuring a recurring (ritornello) idea that suggests the peal of bells. There is a more lyrical second subject, which remains in the same tempo, to maintain energy, before it all concludes in great celebration.'

RESEARCH NEWS

Manx Singers and the BBC

This is the second in an occasional series of articles about notable Manx-born singers who broadcast on BBC radio. Norah Moore* was one of the few to enjoy a professional career beyond the shores of 'the lil' Island', who featured in no less than twenty-three radio programmes between 1927 and 1952; the others being Jean Curphey, a popular concert artiste and frequent broadcaster between 1957 and 1964, and Margaret Curphey, the Isle of Man's only true opera singer, who featured in twenty-five broadcasts between 1965 and 1987.** A generation earlier, Norah's career in many ways foreshadowed that of Jean Curphey's in so much as they had similar repertoires in common: popular operatic and operetta arias, songs from popular musical shows, and Manx songs. After World War II Norah devoted herself to teaching, theatrical producing on the Island and to her successful business career.


* Norah Kathleen Moore (1906-93) was the daughter of Noah Moore, the highly regarded teacher, singer,

choir trainer and, after World War I, the manager of the Villa Marina, and Sarah Quayle. She had one sibling, a brother, Arthur Quayle Moore, a journalist, and perceptive commentator on Island life during the heyday of the tourist industry. She never married.

THE DANCES - Excerpt from'...while the others did some capers': the Manx Traditional Dance revival 1929 to 1960 by Cinzia Curtis:

1. Rinkaghyn Vannin ~ 1.20 Purt Cubbley

As previously discussed typed notes to this dance appear amongst Douglas' notes under the title Moghrey Mie as Maynrys. Its only datable reference is in Rinkaghyn Vannin where it is published as being collected by Douglas. However, in conversation with Sue Ling Jaques (nee Lee) she stated that she and dancer David Callister found the notes to the dance in Douglas' piano stool one day. Further research on the origins of this dance will need to be undertaken, although it would appear to be a relatively new addition to the canon.

Festivals as a meeting place for culture

Who doesn't love a good festival – an opportunity to celebrate culture by coming together for concerts, sessions and talks, friendly competitions, but always threaded through with a deep sense of friendship, community and enjoyment. Since the early days of Culture Vannin, when we were known as the Manx Heritage Foundation, right up to the present, we have supported festivals which are now part of the established Manx cultural calendar, because they bring so much to us all and to our quality of life.

Yn Chruinnaght Inter-Celtic festival is one of the longest-running festivals, taking place each July, and gathering together musicians, dancers and languages from all of the Celtic countries. Last month, I was talking about the work that Mona Douglas did to promote Manannan, and the revived Yn Chruinnaght was her brainchild, too. Now celebrating over 45 years, it has been joined by other festivals such as Shennaghys Jiu each Easter, and the Cooish Manx language festival each Autumn. Culture Vannin supports the Manx cultural elements of the IOM Flower Festival, Oie Voaldyn and Manx Litfest, and many more besides.

Festivals are important to the development of Manx culture for so many reasons. They provide a focus for Manx music, dance, and creativity, giving extra reasons for new material to be developed, arranged or choreographed. They also – rather wonderfully – forge friendships, both on-Island and with visiting performers and audiences. Visiting acts bring new ideas, which in turn inspire us, and connections made often lead to invitations to other festivals around the world.

For Yn Chruinnaght Celtic Gathering, the opportunity to celebrate the myriad of cultures in the Isle of Man has also been a highpoint, especially in their colourful dance displays. Bulgarian and Irish musicians and dancers have featured in recent years, and the wonderful Manx Bulgarian project dreamt up by Our Island, Our World festival, showed how much cultures can gain by 'talking to each other'. Culture helps us see what we have in common, and offers ways to celebrate our differences.

But what about those not on stage but in the audience? Festivals are a great 'extended family' to become part of just by showing up, offering shared experiences full of joy and affirmation! But

we shouldn't forget the volunteers who run the festivals, working all year long to prepare what may only be a weeklong event. Having had the privilege to work on various voluntary committees for festivals and organisations over the years, I have found them a great way to get to know new people of all ages and backgrounds in a way that has enriched my life. If you want to help out, let one of the organisers know and they




will welcome you with open arms!


