# There's been Manx music and dance galore at the 131st Guild / Manx Music, Speech and Dance festival (22 - 29 April)

There was Manx dancing classes featuring Perree Bane, Rushen Primary School & Skeddan Jiarg, folk song classes, The Laxey Boys sang "Laxey Girls" in the Anything Goes class, the Manx Youth Band performed "Peel Castle", Mannin Mini Fiddlers and Uke Group and Ballacottier Primary School all played Manx tunes in the instrumental ensemble classes, as did the trad music group Skimmee Kiaull and Yn Queig on the bagpipes and snare drum. There were also dozens of Manx trad tunes played by harpists and fiddles, bagpipes, tin whistlers and by woodwind soloists.

The Music hall/comedy song class in the Royal Hall was won by Richard Corlett singing "The Isle of Man" and there were poems by Manx authors, Manx Gaelic solo songs, plus choral songs from Ballacottier and Braddan schools and Un Choraa with "Skeealyn Vannin 1" a new medley of Manx songs arranged by Aalin Clague. There have also been original compositions pertaining to the Isle of Man, and of course, the National Anthem at the close of each day!





# Harrish y Cheayn - Across the Sea



Over the Easter weekend, Ruth and Rachel were in the beautiful "Burgh" to perform and teach at the Edinburgh International Harp Festival.

The festival was the one of the first places they performed as a duo, and were inspired to make more music together, so it holds a special place in their hearts (not just for obvious harp-related reasons!). Over the course of the long weekend, Rachel taught a popular harp course called 'Manx to the Max', where students learnt a variety of Manx melodies arranged by Rachel, along with finding out about the culture of the Isle of Man along the way. Ruth taught an hour-long Manx song workshop to 22 harpists, deliberately choosing accessible repertoire that would also allow harpists to accompany themselves, if they wished.

Ruth and Rachel performed music from their album LOSSAN on the evening of Easter Sunday, and loved sharing the night with the talented Scottish harpist Gillian Fleetwood and her ensemble of musicians, who performed a fantastic suite of music featuring harp, fiddle, cello, sousaphone(!) and percussion.

**THE DANCES** - Excerpt from '... while the others did some capers': the Manx Traditional Dance revival 1929 to 1960 by Cinzia Curtis:

### 2. The Leighton Stowell Book of Manx Dances - 2.3 Manx Jig

The history of this dance is, as seen earlier, hopelessly caught up with that of the other solo Manx jig, Cum yn Chen Oanrey Cheh. However, although the references to its performance cannot be distinguished from that of Cum yn Chen Oanrey Cheh in the most part, Stowell does tell the story of its composition for an article in Manninagh (1972). When Douglas found the notes to Cum yn Chen Oanrey Cheh in the notes of her great-grandfather she taught some of it to Stowell, but not the entire dance. As Stowell did not have the whole dance, he composed some figures himself and titled it Cum Shenn Oanrey Cheh after Douglas' collected dance, and performed it at the Albert Hall in 1936.

The tune was also composed by Stowell, although he alludes in some notes to a purt-y-beayll version, words to which have not yet been found. In the 1950s Douglas requested that the MFDS find an alternative name and tune for Stowell's dance to avoid confusion. In his article for Manninagh (1972), Stowell says this was his idea and he then went on to collect a tune from a sheep farmer he met on the Carnanes. Stowell asked if he had heard of a tune called 'Keep the Old Petticoat Warm' a translation of Cum yn Shen Oanrey Cheh and the farmer told him of a tune called 'Red Petticoat'. This tune had a song all about a wedding that was to take place, which had ten verses. This sounds likely to be a local variant of the 'Manx Wedding' as published by Gill in 1896. However, Stowell assumes that this is a dance tune and mentions the plight of a purt y beayll singer having to sing ten verses. The tune is then collected from a Mrs Watterson from the Level, but as Stowell could not find the words he composed some himself about a wedding and keeping a petticoat aired. By this time the dance is most often performed by women, particularly Pat Nicholson.


The dance was published in 1981 in the Leighton Stowell Book of Manx Dances although the tune given is cited as composed by Stowell himself and is evidently not that collected from Mrs

Watterson. It is stated that the arms should be held out to the side throughout the dance.

In her introduction to this volume of dances, Douglas refers to a Southside Jig as collected by Stowell as a boy in Castletown. It seems likely that this refers to this dance, although this information does not tally with that of Stowell's own essay on the dance. It is possible that this refers to Daunse Noo George, which was collected by Stowell, but is not a jig and is a sword dance. It is likely that this small mystery may now never be solved.

This photograph dates from 1926, and was taken on 26 August on the occasion of an excursion by the Isle of Man Natural History and Antiquarian Society to Kirk Christ Lezayre led by William Cubbon. It was taken by a Mr Coole of Cleveland, Ohio, a visiting Manx American along with his wife who features in the photograph. Whilst she is Mona Douglas to us now, she was born Constance Mona Douglas and was known as Constance or "Connie" when younger. It was only when searching the newspapers and not coming across early references to her as Mona Douglas that this becomes apparent. Here she is to be seen in the centre of the group and her style of dress makes her stand out from amongst the others in the party—one feels that she left the Island as Constance and returned as Mona. That there was indeed a change as to how she wished to be addressed is shown in a letter from Roberta Foster in 1930: "My dear C...... (I mean Mona), Yah! you can't touch me now." Of interest too is the woman to the left of Douglas who has her hand around her shoulder and is recognisable as one of W.H. Gill's daughters.

# Further extracts from Haydn Wood and the Isle of Man, a chronology from the Island's newspapers, compiled and annotated by Maurice Powell.

Haydn Wood in May

Isle of Man Times, 7th May, 1892: DOUGLAS AMATEUR MINSTRELS in the Grand Theatre, Thursday 12th May present an Entertainment in aid of the Children's Free Dinners Fund. 'New Songs! New Jokes! New Stump Speech! A programme of comic songs and choruses beginning with an overture entitled Tit-Bits arranged by Harry Wood, who directed the band from the violin. Master Haydn Wood played a violin solo Le Pirate 'envincing an amount of talent and executive skill quite remarkable in so young a player', which was encored, and sang an 'irresistibly funny' comic duo with Lawrence Rushworth, after which they were repeatedly recalled by the audience. 'Wheezes and local jokes and an infectious spirit of frolic' kept the audience thoroughly entertained.

Manx Sun, 16th May, 1903: Haydn Wood awarded the ARCM. He also received the Sir Arthur Sullivan Prize for £5 for composition (for a suite for orchestra).

**Isle of Man Examiner, 8th May 1915:** Haydn Wood's song Bird of Love Divine sung at a London Manx Society Gathering, and was encored.

**Isle of Man Examiner, 10th May 1929:** From The Metronome (a New York periodical published between 1881 and 1961, devoted primarily to popular music, jazz and 'swing'): 'Haydn Wood is unquestionably extraordinarily gifted as a writer of ballads, and his new song, I Love to Hear You Singing, is one of his best contributions to the melody ballads of the day'.

**Isle of Man Times, 4th May, 1935:** Haydn Wood's new march Homage is to be played by the massed Guard's Bands in London's Hyde Park at a thanksgiving service. Asked by an interviewer from the Daily Mail if he had to wait for inspiration to strike before beginning a composition, Haydn Wood replied: 'I sit at the piano a certain hour each day whether I feel like composing or not. Inspiration is much overrated'.

**Isle of Man Times, 7th May 1938:** Broadcast of the Manx Rhapsody King Orry, conducted by the composer, on Sunday 8th May. The brief synopsis

depicts the Island basking under a false sense of security afforded by the Cloak of Mannanan, shielded from attack by the Vikings. Haydn Wood is described as 'a great Manx musician'.

The 2023 Research Festival will take place at the Nunnery in Douglas on Friday 13th October. The aim of the event is to exchange knowledge and ideas, facilitate collaboration between researchers, on and off-Island, promote the reputation of Island-based research, and to educate. Research can be showcased in either a presentation or poster format.

### WILLIAM CURPHEY, FOLK SINGER

There used to be an old man when I was a boy—he was called Willie Curphey, a Jurby man, and he used to be breaking stones by the roadside—this was when we lived at Kerrow garroo in Andreas. He taught my brother Fred to sing Manx songs—he was older than me, and just of an age to learn them—eight or nine, I was only four. My brother used to sing these songs, Ny Kirree Fo Niaghtey was one and there were others, but I have forgotten the titles of the others—but at that age he was good at learning them, and the old man would be singing them to him. When he got older however he got to be that he wouldn't sing them, and he let his knowledge of them go. I was far younger, and I would have had a greater interest in them, but of course I was too young at the time to learn them as Fred had done, from old Curphey. For some reason we always called him "Uncle Peter." Folk Life Survey, c/214, F/I (1972)

This was the recollection of Robert Christory of Bride interviewed by the Folk Life Survey in 1972. In the 1911 census for the Island, there is a William Curphey, aged 79, whose occupation was given as a stone breaker, living at "Lilac Cottage" in Andreas with his son, John (37), a farm labourer, born in Newtown, Whitehaven, and whose wife was Catherine Agnes (37), born in Dublin. William was a Manx speaker, whilst his son was not. As for breaking stones, this was for the repair and maintenance of the Highways. Robert Christory was twelve at the time of the 1911 census, living with his parents, Robert (40) and Emily (39), at Kerrowgarrow in Andreas, his father working as a farm labourer. All were English speakers. We have here a rare glimpse of the transmission of folk songs in the Island, though sadly with just the one title remembered, "Ny Kirree fo Niaghtey," but a song in Manx itself.


