Harpist Mera Royle wins BBC Radio 2 Young Folk Award!

Manx harpist Mera Royle has won the BBC Radio 2 Young Folk Award 2018 beating talent from across the UK!

18 year old Mera is studying for her A-levels at Ramsey Grammar School, and she has been playing harp, violin and whistle since she was eight years old. She takes harp lessons from visiting tutor Rachel Hair which are organised by Culture Vannin, and she is a



member of the Bree youth folk group, Scran, who are about to release their debut album.

Speaking following her win, Mera said: "I'm so happy to have won the BBC Radio 2 Young Folk Award! It was exciting enough for me to just be there surrounded by so many folk legends. It was a really great opportunity and I had an amazing time. Thanks for all the support from everyone back home – it's been so lovely! Thanks to Culture Vannin for all their support, and special thanks to Rachel Hair and Mike Boulton as I wouldn't have even been there without all their incredible help over the years."

As part of her prize, Mera will have the opportunity to perform at several of the UK's major folk festivals.

There was also success for the folk band Ímar. Based in Glasgow, the group of five includes Manx fiddler Tomás Callister and Manx bouzouki player Adam Rhodes. Ímar won the Horizon Award which recognises emerging folk artists.

Another Manx connection was through Jamie Smith, a professional musician who lives in the Isle of Man, as his Welsh group Alaw made it into the finals of the awards for best traditional track. Minister Cregeen said:

"There is a real sense of pride today following the success of Manx artists at this year's Folk Awards. I would like to extend my congratulations to all of the Manx-born or based finalists and winners.

"It is not just about natural talent, it takes hard work, dedication and the support of tutors and families to compete at this level. Making it to the finals alone is a magnificent achievement, so it is very special indeed to see artists from the Isle of Man winning awards."

"The Isle of Man has a rich culture and proud heritage which is perfectly expressed through the outstanding musical talent found on our Island."

The awards ceremony, this year held in Belfast, is a highlight of the folk music calendar and was broadcast live on BBC Radio 2. Highlights can be seen on BBC Four this Sunday 8th April at 9pm and the full awards ceremony is available to listen to again online. (photo credit BBC)

CYCLEFEST 2018 SATURDAY 21ST AND SUNDAY 22ND APRIL Elephant Sessions and Ross & Ali headline new Festival Club!

Isle of Man Cyclefest presented by Isle of Man Bank returns to the glorious grounds of Milntown Estate for it's third edition in 2018 with a new Spring date and an expanded programme of family entertainment. For many visitors to Milntown, however, Cyclefest is all about the soundtrack and there's even more for music lovers in 2018, with Cyclefest's very own Festival Club.

From sundown till late, the Cyclefest HQ will bounce to the new sounds of foot stomping Trad courtesy of the returning Elephant Sessions and this year's BBC Folk Award winners, Ross and Ali.

Their individual musical journeys have led them through a long list of high profile awards, but it was their much-anticipated collaboration, Symbiosis, that confirmed the duo as true pioneers of the ever-evolving Scottish traditional music scene. Combining their love of pipes and whistles with a wider exploration of traditional music and modern studio craft, Ross and Ali's debut album is simply stunning and earned the pair an invite to BBC's Folk Awards at the Royal Albert Hall where they were named Best Duo.

Away from the Festival Club, there's much more for music fans. Fresh from their recent appearance on the returning Old Grey Whistle Test, Wildwood Kin are set to headline Saturday's line up on the main stage. Jake Isaac, meanwhile, visits the Isle of Man after stealing the headlines at Cambridge Folk Festival with his high-energy fusion of soulful roots and funky beats.

There's more for fans of Trad too, as former Folk Awards winner Sam Kelly visits Cyclefest along with his band, The Lost Boys. There's high-octane Americana with CC Smugglers, grunge era roots with William the Conqueror and gospel country with AMA awards winner Yola Carter to name just a few of Cyclefest's dozen acts.

As well as fantastic music, Isle of Man Cyclefest will also deliver a weekend's worth of entertainment catering for young families. All festival events are absolutely FREE upon entry to Milntown Estate and wristbands tickets are available to purchase on the gate on the day. 

Good Friday has a curious custom in the Isle of Man, where people were said to have cooked flitters (limpets) on the beach! Yum yum.



New bursary available for aspiring young musicians aged 16-21

Two aspiring young Manx musicians could benefit from a new annual bursary of up to £1,000 each to fund a place at music summer school of their choice in the UK.

The bursary has been established thanks to the generous and thoughtful bequest of Roz Kelly, a talented and accomplished Manx musician who sang with the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Choir and the Liverpool Chamber Choir.

Roz first started to learn the violin while a pupil at Braddan Primary School and also enjoyed singing and playing the piano, often participating in 'The Guild'.

Roz joined the Manx Youth Orchestra in 1981 and took part in various tours. She continued to enjoy music



making as a student at Liverpool University where she studied physics and gained a PhD.

After seeing what fun the brass section of the orchestra had, Roz also took up the French horn.

Later, when Roz was too ill to play or sing, music continued to give her great pleasure and she enjoyed going to the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic when she could.

Roz was keen that others would have the opportunity to participate in music as she had and wanted to be able to further that through her bequest.

Maggie Richardson, Head of Music Service, said: "I was very humbled to talk to Roz shortly before she died. She wanted to share with me some of the very fond musical memories she had, especially of playing with the Manx Youth Orchestra. She took part in some tours and her favourite experience was sleeping under the stars during their tour to Israel.

"Roz was so passionate about giving back and her bequest will ensure many years of young people benefiting from her generosity."

Applications are open to Isle of Man residents aged 16 – 21 who are able to demonstrate their musical promise and enthusiasm through a written application and provide a written recommendation from a teacher, musical mentor or similar.

The funding can only be used towards the cost of travel and participation at the music summer school of their choice. It can be for any genre or style of music, from classical music to rock and pop or musical theatre to instrument making.

Welcome to the Isle of Man Composers Network, a group for composers on the Isle of Man who work in the fields of Contemporary Classical/Modern Classical music.

The aims are:

-To encourage a greater sense of community among composers on the Island

-To enable composers to meet together to discuss our work and to learn from each other

-In the long term, to open up more opportunities for performances of new Manx music.

For a while, I have felt that it would be good to establish a group for the Island's composers. There are a number of reasons for this.

While I was at University, we had an informal Composers group that met up after our lectures to share ideas and generally discuss composition and music-related things. I found that being part of this "mini-community" was really helpful, and it's something I've missed since returning to the Island.

I've realized that there is a lot more going on in terms of modern "classical" music on the Island than most music-loving people would know about. Lots of fantastic things have been done to promote and raise the profile of the Manx folk scene, and I think it's about time that something similar happened with Manx "classical" music too.



RESEARCH NEWS

"MANX SOCIAL AT DERBY ROAD" (1905)

The young people (and divers of the elder folk) connected with the church of the Methodist New Connexion, situated in Derby-road, spent a must enjoyable evening on Easter Monday, their entertainment being dubbed a "Manx Social and Concert." The first portion of the programme conststed of a number of Manx songs, including "Hush, little darling," sung by Miss E. Bell; "The Maid of Purt-e-Chee," Miss Horsley; "Gwendolen," Miss Spence; "Ramsey Town" and "Ellan Vannin," Mr W.L. Spence; "The Manx Weddin'," and "Mannin Veg Villish Veg Veen," Mr Williamson; and "Mylecharaine" (in the Manx language), by Mr T. Caine. Miss Fargher accompanied. Next followed a dialogue, entitled "The Haunted Room," in which it is possible that some one or other of the old Manx legends may have had part, followed by what to Manxman and Scotnagh is equally welcome, refreshments. The menu was in Manx, and comprised the proverbial pinjane and bonnag, "arranchag" (a free translation of lemon-cheese cakes), "arran ben-y-ree" (sultana cake), "arran chapit" (soda-cake), "braghtyn" (cucumber sandwiches), "arran rasa" (seed cake), and the ever-welcome "paggad of tay." Games followed for another hour, and of all the 100 persons who presented themselves everyone thoroughly enjoyed his or herself. It may be added that a number of the ladies arranging this charming little function were attired in Manx costume.

"[Douglas] Manx Social at Derby Road." Manx Sun 29 April 1905: 5f.

Both young and old as the piece reminds us were present on Easter Monday at the Manx Social Concert held at the Methodist New Connexion chapel on Derby Road in Douglas. The turnout was an impressive one with some one hundred people in attendance. Many of the titles of the music on offer are familiar ones from the time—"Ellan Vannin," "Gwendolen," "Hush, little darling," "The Maid of Purt-e-Chee," "Mannin Veg Villish Veg Veen," "The Manx Weddin'," "Mylecharaine," "Ramsey Town"—though now out of favour but resonating at the time as expressing a sense of Manx-ness. "Mylecharaine" was sung in Manx and the ever-popular "Ramsey Town" was performed, a song that also enjoyed wide popularity with the Manx diaspora. Manx folklore was seemingly featured in the dialogue of The Haunted Room. Then to top off the evening was the food with the menu in Manx and here the *Manx Sun* provides us with a handy vocabulary for navigating such a welcome High Tea in the future. The helpers were attired in Manx costume and this was a feature of such events which overall have not been studied at all.

"SAM HAGUE'S MINSTRELS" (1883)

On Tuesday these minstrels visited the town [*ie*, Castletown]. After parading the streets with the bands, they played in the Market-place for a short time, before dispersing. On re-assembling, they started for Douglas at noon. A great many people, taking advantage of the late train from Douglas, went to witness their performance.

"[Castletown and the South] Sam Hague's Minstrels." *Isle of Man Examiner* 29 September 1883.

Sam Hague's Operatic British Minstrels (to give them their full title) were as the name makes clear a minstrel troupe, though one performing in blackface, there being no African Americans present amongst the players. Hague had owned a previous troupe, Sam Hague's Slave Troupe of Georgia Minstrels, who enjoyed an eighteen-year run at St James's Hall in Liverpool, one that ended in the mid-1870s when he sold the company and they returned to America. In 1881, he founded his own minstrel troupe who as seen here turned up in Castletown in 1883. These days it is a trope of Island life that a trip from Castletown to anywhere requires careful planning and an element of foresight—here, they simply took the train to Douglas.




This year's Manx Folk Awards choir classes were themed around 'Year of Our Island'.
