The Braaid Eisteddfod


Saturday 4th March at the Braaid Hall, with a start time of 7pm (which is earlier than previous years).

ISLE OF MAN MUSICIANS TAKE CENTRE STAGE AS DAVY KNOWLES, MEC LIR AND MABON HEADLINE CYCLEFEST

The two-day festival at Milntown Estate on Saturday 13th, and Sunday 14th of May, is the centrepiece part of Isle of Man Cyclefest presented by Isle of Man Bank and it will be the spectacular line up of local and visiting musicians as part of the PokerStars entertainment that will guarantee a fabulous weekend of live music and great family times.

First up are Celtic super group Mec Lir, and after finishing off the Festival in 2016, the boys are back to kick things off in stunning style. Later on Saturday, Cyclefest welcomes Davy Knowles, back on the Isle of Man for a spectacular homecoming gig. The Elephant Sessions are a Neo-Trad quintet that combine their ceilidh-esque sound with undertones of ska, rock and funk. Already renowned for their energetic and engaging live shows, the band kicked off

Also fresh from an appearance at Celtic Connections is 20 year-old Kizzy Crawford. Isle of Man Cyclefest is also delighted to welcome back Isla Callister who returns with her newly formed group TRIP. All currently in their first year at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland, the six members of TRIP already boast an impressively varied and expansive sound that contrasts from fast jigs and reels to captivating Gaelic song, with Lewis singer Mairi Maclennan adding her beautiful vocals to the group's armoury.

In addition to this already impressive line up, Isle of Man Cyclefest also boasts two of the UK's leading country artists in BCMA Vocalist of the Year, Laura Oakes, and UK Country No1 artist Katy Hurt, as well as two of the UK's leading Americana artists in William the Conqueror (Ruarri Joseph) and blistering bluegrass group Flats and Sharps, both AMAUK award nominees.

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Easter exchange with Croan Yn Tead and The Lissenhall Harp Ensemble

As part of a cultural exchange programme that started in September 2015 between young musicians of traditional Manx music "Croan Yn Tead" and Irish harp champion Fiana Ní Chonaill, "The Lissenhall Harp Ensemble" under the auspices of Fiana, will be visiting the Island over the Easter weekend.

Both groups are looking forward to meeting up with each other and a programme



of events and cultural activities is well under way, which includes visits to places of interest, workshops, and an evening concert featuring local, and visiting musicians from Ireland.

On Saturday, 15th April there will be music workshops in the afternoon, followed by an evening concert of Manx and Irish traditional Celtic music by both Croan Yn Tead and The Lissenhall Harp Ensemble. The concert will be followed by a CD launch with Fiana Ní Chonaill and guests. Fiana has recently launched her debut CD "Dathanna an Cheoil" and will be available to purchase on the evening as well as from her website ~ www.fianaharpmusic.com

The venue for both the workshops and the evening concert is The Youth Arts Theatre, Kensington Road, Douglas. The workshops are aimed at harpers primarily, but any trad musicians are welcome to attend. There will be an opportunity to learn both Manx and Irish tunes from local and visiting musicians and the workshops will run between 2 – 5pm, and entry to the workshops is by donation. The evening concert kicks off at 8pm sharp and doors will open at 7:30pm. We're aiming to be finished by around 10:30 and the audience is in for a real treat of Manx and Irish Celtic music. Tickets are £5, under 13s free.



"We are still looking for people to partner with us and get involved with the cultural exchange, especially members of the harp fraternity on the Island, but we will welcome any involvement from interested parties", said Peddyr Cubberley, one of the organisers of the exchange. "we're looking for folk to help us host our visiting musicians and to get actively involved during their visit which will be a very rewarding experience as we had in last year. Isle of Man: Making Celtic Connections at one of Glasgow's Biggest Festivals

If there's one way of shaking off those winter blues, it's undoubtedly a visit to the hugely successful Scottish festival Celtic Connections, where musicians linked to the Manx music scene showed ticket holders just how vibrant the trad scene is on the Isle of Man.

Based in Glasgow, this annual folk, roots and world music festival attracts more than two thousand musicians from across the globe, for eighteen days of festival fusion and the pick of a staggering three hundred events.

The festival is renowned for its strong ethic of collaboration and having an almost instinctive ability to select some of the world's finest singers and musicians for this annual event.

Many Manx performers have been able to take advantage of this winning formula, and this year proved no exception. Adam Rhodes, Tom Callister and Jamie Smith are all well known musicians on the Manx circuit and appeared in Glasgow under various guises.

The Unusual Suspects, incorporating all three music maestros, is a long standing, transatlantic combination, which derives its influences from a myriad of musicians; some of which are linked to more mainstream names such

as Elton John, Wham and Tower of Power. The current team stems from a powerful performance at the Nova Scotia based Celtic Colours Festival, after which they were subsequently invited to Glasgow, where they slipped in a selection of original and traditional Manx tunes during their performance at the Glasgow Royal Concert Hall.

Additionally, Tom and Adam made a further appearance at the recently built RSNO Theatre as part of a new line-up called Ímar. Said to be Glasgow's hottest new folk property, their sell-out concert doubled as a perfect opportunity to launch their debut album Afterlight.

Adam told Manx Tails, "It's always an honour to be asked to perform at Celtic Connections, and this year even more so! It was amazing to play with the Unusual Suspects again, with such a fantastic line up of musicians from both sides of the Atlantic, it's an experience I'll never forget. Then launching Ímar's debut CD at a sold out gig a few days later, what a great week!"

Ímar will also be performing at the Centenary Centre in Peel on the 14th April, before heading off on an extended tour of the UK and Ireland.

During 2015 the Celtic Connections festival secured the Art and Culture Award at the Inspiring City Awards ceremony. The awards were created to celebrate the people and organisations of Glasgow, with the ceremony organised by the Herald and Glasgow's Chamber of Commerce in association with People Make Glasgow.

WELSH SESSION

Manx music was heard recently in a Welsh traditional music session in Ystradgynlais, South Wales. While on a visit there last year, David Speers found the session and was welcomed by the musicians. On his return recently, he discovered a couple of connections with the Isle of Man.

Accordion player Mike Greenwood, plays at this, and other sessions in South Wales. Mike was a regular visitor to the Island in the 1980's and early 90's as a musician for Welsh dance groups. He has fond memories of the Island and learned a selection of Manx dance tunes during that time, which he played at the session.

David also recognised a couple of Welsh tune that had showed a strong resemblance



to Manx tunes: Glandyfi (similar to our 'Gyn Ennym' - St Patrick's Day in the Morning in Ireland; and Llancesau Trefaldwyn (Maids of Montgomery), the 'b' part being very similar to our Moirrey ny Gainle. David says he 'went through both these tunes with the other musicians and they were very interested in them and a couple of other Manx tunes I played".

"Most of the Manx session tunes, those that can be played in traditional dance times, have a similarity with Irish tunes, so it was interesting to find a couple of tunes from Wales that also seem to be related".

Another interest for the Welsh musicians was the Manx language, which was discussed in talking about tune names, song words and local place names. "We know that the two languages are distinct, but related, but we still had fun with spotting similarities", said David.

The Liberal Jewish Synagogue, Ensemble Émigré and The Royal College of Music present a programme of words and music that brings together the voices of German and Austrian composers who came to Britain seeking refuge from Nazi oppression and who were 'collared' by Churchill in the internment camps on the Isle of Man from 1940–41.

This concert will feature music written in the internment camps for German and Austrian nationals on the Isle of Man in 1940, some of which has only come to light through recent research at the Royal College of Music. It will include excerpts from the bilingual comic revue "What a Life!" by Hans Gál as well as excerpts from the 'Ursonate' by the dadaist artist Kurt Schwitters who was also interned.

In addition, the concert will feature music connected to cultural life on the Isle of Man, celebrating its beautiful countryside and its legacy of popular entertainment for the sun-seeking seaside holiday-makers that used to occupy the very same boarding houses where the internees found themselves in 1940.

The programme includes works by Kurt Schwitters, Hans Gál, Peter Gellhorn and others. Performances by Norbert Meyn, Alke Quartet, Lucy Colquhoun and Cathy Heller Jones. Narrator and libretto: Joseph Kohlmaier.

The concert is preceded by a conversation with Sue Lukes, a founder of the charity Music in Detention, and a performance by Lucky Moyo, a former member of Zimbabwean music and dance ensemble Black Umfolosi, who will speak about his experience as an immigrant to the United Kingdom.



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RESEARCH NEWS

The Origins of 'Hi! Kelly'

This article – the first of three - represents some early conclusions from an on-going investigation into a Manx musical and cultural phenomenon: the rise of the Kelly songs. A second article will look at the music hall Kelly songs popularised by Florrie Forde and others; a final article will offer a brief survey of the large number of popular songs about the Isle of Man, excluding the well-known traditional Manx songs that appear in Manx National Songs and elsewhere, about which there is already a comprehensive literature. Firstly, however, the identity of the popular figure who would become known as 'Kelly from the Isle of Man', must be established if possible. Was he a well-known local person, or, because the name Kelly was common on the Island,1 was he a mythical character of popular culture, the archetypical Manxman, the subject of music hall songs and the butt of countless jokes as indeed are 'Paddy' and 'Jock' today? Was he in fact a Manxman at all? And how did the call of 'Hi! Kelly' come into being as a local way of hailing a carriage or other conveyance, and why did it become so familiar and popular with visitors to the Island.

The final meeting of the session was held at the Scout Hall, Douglas, on Saturday evening, and was in the nature of a 'Hidden Talent' programme. The first item was a short play by Miss Mona Douglas, entitled 'The Churning,' which was performed by Miss I. Quillin, K. Kneale, S. Sayle, and Mr E. Corteen. Miss A. I. Caine sang two songs, one to the tune, 'The Widow's House,' with words by Mr P. W. Caine, and the other, "Ushag Veg Ruy" (Little Red Bird of the Lonely Moor). Miss E. M. Quayle read a paper, 'A Summer Idyll,' describing a ramble through the Curraghs; and Mr Ashton Cannell told some amusing stories in dialect. Research into traditional music links is published

The historical significance of 19th century Manx ballads and songs has provided the basis for an article that has been accepted into a prestigious Irish academic music publication.

Manx researcher, author and musician David Speers has had his research into the links between Manx traditional ballads and those performed in Ireland, England and Scotland published in the pages of Bealoideas, the Journal of the Folklore of Ireland, vol 84.

This particular journal is peer reviewed, and rarely publishes articles that are not based on Irish traditional or folklore subjects.

David's article looks at the links between ballad

titles in music manuscripts contained in collections held by the Manx Museum, and compares them with music published as broadside ballad sheets in Britain and Ireland during the 18th and 19th centuries.

From studying 63 different ballads brought to the island on ballad sheets during the 19th century from areas such as Liverpool, Glasgow, Dublin and London.

David's research shows that these were not only learned and sung across the island, but in many cases they were adapted to suit the Isle of Man.

'This shows that the Isle of Man was fully integrated into the broader community of traditional singing that existed in Ireland and Britain,' said David.

'It also shows that a considerable proportion of secular ballads known and sung in the Isle of Man were in English. However, there was also a tradition here of replacing the English with Manx Gaelic words for those who didn't speak English.'

David said that many of the songs covered topics that reflected important themes in the Isle of Man at the time, such as sea faring and the island's role in the English wars at the time.

Only two other Manx authors have had research printed in the Bealoideas, Anne Gilchrist, who was published in the 1920s, and Professor George Broderick, who was featured twice in the early 1980s.

'There has not been that much research published on Manx music and ballads,' he said. 'I'm glad to be able to get this work published in such a respected journal.' *Original article from: www.iomtoday.co.im*
