PREPARING FOR THE MANX FOLK AWARDS - NEW FILMS FROM ARBORY SCHOOL

A primary school in the south of the Island is celebrated in a new series of short films from Culture Vannin.

The four films visit Arbory School as they prepare their entries of Manx music, song and dance for a major part of the school calendar in the Isle of Man, the Manx Folk Awards.

A relaxed week of competitions held each Spring term, the Manx Folk Awards offer an accessible way for all school-age children to discover Manx culture and make it their own. 29 different schools took place this year, but one of the schools which has consistently embraced this fully from the start has been Arbory School.

The primary school in Ballabeg throws itself into the event organised by DESC and Culture Vannin each year, ensuring success in the competitions but, more importantly, an enormous sense of enrichment for the school community and children.

Jonathan Ayres, Head teacher of Arbory School says:

"Arbory School has always been at the centre of the local community with which it has strong links in terms of culture and heritage. The Manx Folk Awards gives pupils an opportunity to work on new projects as well as to showcase their skills and talents, specifically linked to Manx culture, outside the local area. The Manx Folk Awards enables children to participate alongside other students from around the Island where they make connections and benefit from feeling part of a larger cultural community. Teachers and



children come together to share and celebrate 'Manxness' in a competitive but relaxed atmosphere. This helps to promote our unique culture whilst enabling children to build their confidence, to perform in front of an audience and to have fun."

This has been explored in a series of four short films, now available on the Culture Vannin website and YouTube channel. 'Preparing for the Manx Folk Awards' puts a spotlight on rehearsals with the school choir, folk music group and dance teams, and features interviews with both staff and pupils.

There are also two films which highlight the long-standing tradition of Manx dancing at Arbory.

The school has had a brilliant record with Manx dance for decades. As well as performing at the Manx Folk Awards, the school enjoys its annual Laa Columb Killey performances every 27th

June and the children regularly compete at the Guild. Over the years, they have built up an inspiringly positive and open environment for Manx dance, resulting in a very high standard of performance.



At the centre of the school's dance practice is Triana Collister. After many years as a well-respected and much-loved teacher, this is her final term at the school before retirement, so the filming also offered the opportunity to discover the secret to her success!

Dr Chloë Woolley, Manx Music Development Officer at Culture Vannin, says:

"We wanted to make these films with Arbory partly to recognise the great

work they are doing, partly to record their long relationship with Manx culture, but also to give a living example of how much schools or organisations can gain by engaging with traditional music, song, dance and language. Doing so offers so much to young people today, giving them important values as they go forward with their lives."

One of the stand-out interviews in the film was with a young girl who gives an observation beyond her years:

"When you're preforming, it's stuff from all around the world, but at the Manx Folk Awards, it's only Manx stuff, and it makes you feel like you're part of a proud and great nation."

James Franklin, Online & Educational Resources Officer at Culture Vannin, says:

"It was a privilege to be a part of the filming in the school, watching the positivity and enjoyment which the children and staff got from their coming together to practise Manx music, song and dance. It was clear how enriching and positive the experiences were, which is exactly why we made the films – to show how exciting it all is!"

This Fair Isle: Manx music arranged by Kevin Kelly



A simple Manx music enquiry to Culture Vannin led to a visit to the Isle of Man, and now American composer and choral director Dr. Kevin Kelly has produced a suite of Manx songs for chorus and harp!

Kevin's collection of 19 songs was premiered last month in a concert called 'This Fair Isle: Celtic Folksongs & Dances from the Isle of Man'. Held in Athens, Georgia, USA, on Saturday 26th April, the sell-out concert starred the Athens Chamber Singers with Elizabeth Veal on harp, and Kevin as conductor.

With a variety of arrangements of Manx songs in English, such as "Love of My Heart" (Graih my Chree), "Sea Invocation", "King of the Sea" and "Slumber Song", Kevin has kindly given Culture Vannin permission to share the live concert recording on Bandcamp and manxmusic.com.

Kevin's interest in Manx music began nearly a decade ago, when he was Supervisor of the University of Georgia Music Library and emailed Culture Vannin with a question about a Manx song. After several months of corresponding with Dr Chloë Woolley, Manx Music Development Officer for Culture Vannin, Kevin and his wife decided to visit the Isle of Man to attend Yn Chruinnaght Celtic Gathering and he has since become an avid follower of Manx music.

Kevin said: "Our concert drew a full house and many in the audience were asking questions about the Isle of Man; maybe we gave your tourist trade a little boost!" He added: "It's a dream... but I'd love for my choir to come to the Isle of Man and do a concert tour".

As well as this choral suite, Kevin has arranged dozens of Manx folk songs and dance tunes for recorder quartet; all of which are available as sheet music on manxmusic.com

Chloë said; "It's amazing that Manx songs and melodies can spark such enthusiasm and creativity across the Atlantic, and I'm delighted to have helped Kevin bring a little piece of the Isle of Man to Georgia, USA! "

Orry Corjeag

Manx Violinist and the first Baume Scholar

Orry Corjeag was the professional name of the Manx-born violinist, composer, arranger and conductor George Samuel Robinson, normally known as 'Sam'. It is not known why he adopted the name 'Corjeag', but the rare Manx surname was known particularly in the Parish of Michael and surrounding area.*

"A GENUINE DUTCH FOLK DANCE" (1957)



Children at Kirk Michael Primary School performing a genuine Dutch folk dance at the Dutch Bulb afternoon on Tuesday. This issue contains pictures of a most enjoyable and picturesque afternoon at Michael Primary School last Tuesday, when the scholars held a hyacinth bulb competition. The idea was born in the mind of Headmaster Gair. He contacted the Dutch Embassy and they supplied all the bulbs which the children "brought up" themselves, finishing them off with charming and most ingenious flower pots. Altogether a hundred flowers were on show. The judges, Mrs H.L. Fletcher and Miss D.V. Stubbs, awarded first prize, a medal, to little Andrea Kneale, and gave diplomas to Juan Quayle, Margaret Barron, Doreen Mayne, Barry Swann, David Corlett and Stephen Higham. The children then entertained their parents and friends, and all the items had a Dutch "flavour"; the children were dressed in the national costume of that friendly country, and the school walls were decorated with Dutch posters and copies of famous paintings. Dutch cheese and other manufactured goods were on view. The scholars had been working on "Holland" as a topic and the afternoon saw the end of the project.

People in Kirk Michael are still talking about the "afternoon which was so different."

It is remarkable what one comes across in the Manx newspapers, and as ever only by chance, as Dutch folk dancing at Kirk Michael Primary School in 1957, is likely not on anyone's research agenda.

"... you've got a great freedom to do what you like with [Manx music] and I do feel that. I don't feel I owe it to anybody. There's not somebody hovering, standing over your shoulder... - Lifelong Learning


