To celebrate studying a unit on the Celts for their Manx history lessons, Year 3 at Murray's Road School put on a super show called 'Giant Finn' last month which featured songs about the Celtic legend and specially chosen Manx songs. The play tells of Finn being challenged to a fight by another giant called Culcullin which leads to Finn pretending to be his own baby son and biting his rival's finger off! Year 3 teacher Eliza King incorporated the songs 'Are you Ready for a Fight?' and 'Traa dy Gholl dy Valley' (featured in Manx music educational resource *Gow Ayrn*) into the play. MHF buys harp for talented youngster

The Manx Heritage Foundation has recently bought a new Celtic Harp for a pupil in the north of the Island.

Amy Stoutt is a pupil of Mike Boulton, a former teacher at Albert Road School and a pioneer in the teaching of Manx music in schools. Mike continues to help youngsters towards a greater appreciation of the Island's traditional music but such is the demand for harps that he turned to the Manx Heritage Foundation for help.



The Foundation has helped a number of Manx musicians purchase instruments in recent years, and was also responsible for starting the hugely successful harp classes in Douglas, now run by the Department of Education.

The new harp is a hand-built instrument, made by Pilgrim Harps of Surrey, and is strung with traditional gut strings.


Tribute to Colin Jerry RBV

Whether you knew him as uilleann piper, jazz trumpeter, instrument maker, Manx Gaelic speaker, artist, White Boys actor or teacher, Colin Jerry will be sadly missed. Suddenly taken ill at a session at the Tynwald just before Christmas, he died the same evening in Nobles.


For those of us involved in Manx music, his contribution is both inspiring and staggering. Founding member of Bwoie Doal, one of the most influential groups in the early days of the revival in the 1970s, he led sessions at the White House in Peel and was a regular at the Tynwald and took musicians to festivals such as Lorient. His transcriptions from the Clague-Gill manuscripts as *Kiaull yn Theay 1&2* and later *Kiaull Vannin* have proved the essential sources for Manx musicians and those



interested in Manx music. His 1982 beginners book *Cur Cheb* introduced Manx music to recorder and whistle players. But, as Greg Joughin comments in this month's *Yn Pabyr Seyr*, it was the two *Kiaull yn Theay* books which will continue to form the centrepiece of Manx traditional circles: 'Affectionately referred to as the red and yellow books, they have, without doubt, formed the single most significant contribution to the promotion of Manx Music, since its revival.'




Colin was a gifted Manx speaker who wrote his own songs and translated many others from English. Together with John Kaneen he produced *A Garland for John Clague: A New Book of Old Songs*. His own collection of songs (both original and translations) *Angels, Soldiers, Lovers and Other Folks*



appeared in 1993. His stories and writings in Manx appear in publications like *Skealaght*, *Ny Three Muckyn Beggey*

Many years ago at an informal session at the Creg Malin, a somewhat inebriated young man approached the group of musicians. Anticipating a rather less than friendly reception to their tunes, the group was very pleasantly surprised to be asked if they knew a tune like the Mhelliah, or the one that goes like this... And how did the young man know about Manx music? A wonderful teacher at primary school called Colin Jerry – 'he was great'.



Colin was awarded the Reih Bleaney Vanannan in 1991 for his great contribution to Manx culture.



The funeral will take place at the Cathedral in Peel on Thursday 8 January at 2pm and will in all likelihood be followed by a music session nearby.

NEWS FROM PERREE BANE

Perree Bane has moved! As from 4th January, we will be practising on Sunday evenings at Ballasalla Village Hall. Whilst we will not be doing any beginners' classes in

the near future, anyone who would like to see what goes on and maybe join in will be very welcome from 7pm onwards. There is quite a tradition of Manx dancing at Ballasalla. From the late 1980s to the 1990s Perree Bane practised there, and in years past it was where Philip Leighton-Stowell drilled his Guild team, legend having it that he would not let them go home until they got it right!

Perree Bane enjoyed dancing at the Farmers' market at Castletown just before Christmas – some would consider this going back to the roots of folk-dance, when musicians and dancers would often perform at such public gatherings. Despite some of the stall-holders being dragged into the last dance, we may well be invited again.

As to the Cammag on St Stephen's Day, Perree Bane, playing, naturally, for the Southern team, were robbed of a well-deserved win by some dubious kicking of the ball by the Northern team. Doubtless they will get their come-uppance next year!
