

## Shennaghys Jiu - Tradition Today! 21<sup>st</sup>-24<sup>th</sup> March

With visiting Scottish musicians Full Spate and multi-instrumentalist duo Michael Hayward and Laura Grime *as well as* a new-look committee, Shennaghys Jiu returns to its roots for 2008. One of the highlights of this year's festival will be a night

devoted to new tunes and new(-ish) bands: Pobble, The Reeling Stones, Peddyr Cubberley, The Ballaghs, King Chiaullee and Katie Lawrence who will provide something new and something old to hold your interest – Sunday 23<sup>rd</sup>, 8pm at the Grand Island Hotel, Ramsey. ## Archibald Knox weekend



The Archibald Knox Society celebrated the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the famous Liberty designer and Manx artist's death in a weekend full of talks, tours, concerts and dinners. Manx Gaelic choir, Caarjyn Cooidjagh, sang a mixture of old and new songs at the opening concert and lecture at St Matthews, Douglas. The songs selected included a premiere of one of Annie Kissack's latest arrangements – a setting of the Manannan or Traditionary Ballad. John Riley played a wonderful selection of Manx music as the audience arrived, including old favourites from the Manx National Songbook and from Haydn Wood arrangements. On the Saturday night, the pre-dinner reception saw music from Skeeal in the atrium of the Sefton.

# Why is the WI hitting things in the name of Manx music?!

In what has been described as 'a sort of Stomp for the WI', composer Barry Russell has been leading percussion workshops with members of the WI in preparation for 'Dances in Time of Celebration' which premieres this month. Making use of 'found percussion' instruments such as plastic containers and broom handles, around 20 members from various branches of the Women's Institute are taking part in the two concert exchange between the Manx Youth Orchestra and the Liverpool Philharmonic Youth Orchestra on 2 and 16 March. According to William Cashen in Paton's *Manx Calendar Customs*, 'No light was expected to be lighted after St Patrick's Day. It was supper at dark and then to bed, both man and beast.' which accounts for the Manx saying: Laa'l Parick arree, yn dow gys e staik as y dooinney gys e lhiabbee (Patrick's spring feast-day, the ox to its stake and the man to his bed). You'll undoubtedly find many Manx musicians in the pub playing a mix of Manx and Irish tunes and drinking a pint or two of 'stoo doo' (the black stuff)!

There will be at least two Manx ceilis led by the group, and some of the dancers will no doubt appear on stage with Mabon, providing spectre


Mabon, providing spectacular displays to complement Mabon's stylish sets.
